At this time of year, winter sets in and the world around us grows darker. For some people, it can seem like winter all year around as they struggle to see clearly in the spiritual darkness that surrounds them. However, as we find in this week's פרשה, lack of clarity itself can actually lead to very positive outcomes.

יצחק אבינו became visually impaired as he grew older. This led to יעקב receiving the ברכות in place of עשו, as he was famously able to masquerade as his brother. Already we are being taught that the lack of clear vison can actually result in blessing. The question many ask though, is how could יצחק possibly want to bentch יצחקב? Surely he was aware of עשו's evil ways, well established by this point in the story?

The מי השילוח זיע"א exquisitely explains that יצחק was fully aware of עשו's bad behaviour. But he believed that he could do תשובה and turn his life around. In fact, he felt that for this reason with needed the ברכות more than עשו. In his mind therefore, his כונות were, that come what may, even if עשו was far from perfect, he should be gebentched, so that one day, when he would turn his life around, the ברכות would be fulfilled.

However, הקב"ה knew that עקב's children would not always be צדיקים. And so the nature of would be necessary for יעקב as well. In this way, יעקב's descendants would be protected by ברכות s'צחק if they occasionally strayed from the path.

So it was really ''צחק's inability to see that has actually "seen us through" this long and difficult ....



## CHIZUK IN THE SIDDUR

יהי כבוד (Part 11)

For He spoke and it came to be, He commanded and it stood firm.

This פסוק takes us back to the beginning of time and reinforces our מעשה בראשית. In fact רבינו בחיי right at the start of בראשית explains that in reality everything was created from total nothingness on the first day and then on the subsequent days of creation, הקב"ה gave them form and longevity.

This is why our פסוק has two parts to it. הוא אמר ויהי is the fact that הקב"ה created everything with the power of speech (which is the idea of creating something outside of oneself) and הוא צוה ויעמוד is that once it was created it was, so to speak, 'made to last'.

The truth is that nothing in the world has independent existence, rather it all continues to exist as a result of הקב"ה willing it to be so, each and every moment. This is why the says says הוא צוה ויעמד, it is only because of His commandment that anything in this world can 'stand' as it is.

Since everything exists as a result of הקב"ה words, let us think about how important it must be to listen to His words, the words of תורה, the blueprint of Creation.

## CHIZUK FROM OUR CHACHOMIM

This Tuesday, ה' כסלו, marks the *Yohrzeit* of **Rav Boruch Ber Leibowitz** זצ"ל.

Born in Slutzk, Belarus, in 1870, young Boruch Ber gained a reputation as a child genius. He went to learn in Volozhin where he became fiercely attached to Rav Chaim Soloveichik אנ"ל, and would become one of his foremost תלמידים, spreading his Rebbe's then novel מהלך הלימוד. At the young age of 16, he received סמיכה from Rav Yitzchok Elchonon Spektor זצ"ל.

He married Faige Zimmerman of Hlusk, daughter of the town בר, Rav Avrohom Yitzchok, whom Rav Boruch Ber would succeed as the מרא דאתרא. In 1904, he was appointed as ישיבת כנסת יצחק in קראש הישיבה of the day. During World War 1, he had to relocate the ישיבה to Kremenchung and then to Vilna before eventually settling in Kamenitz in 1926, where the ישיבה flourished for the next 13 years. In 1928, he went to the USA to raise funds for the ישיבה. New York City Mayor, Jimmy Walker, presented Rav Boruch Ber with the key to the city and stated that Rav Boruch Ber alone proved the existence of Hashem, for only a G-d could have made someone like Ray Boruch Ber!

Aside from his mind-blowing גאונות, he was also known as a tremendous בעל מידות. His daughter was engaged to be married, but unfortunately the חתן broke off the שידוך in heart-breaking fashion. Many years later the man had the temerity to ask Rav Boruch Ber for a written approbation for a job in that he was pursuing. Rav Boruch Ber sat down and wrote a beautiful letter, full of praise and accolades, for the man who had broken his daughter's heart. He then called in two בחורים to go over the letter and to make sure that it was praiseworthy enough, for he wanted to make sure that not even a tiny bit of animosity still lingered in his heart!

In 1939, when the Nazis invaded Kamenitz, he moved the ישיבה to Vilna. He fell ill and on ישיבה he was lying in bed with two of his תלמידים attending to him, when he suddenly perked up and said, 'The Rebbe is here'! He asked the בחורים to say over some חורה of Rav Chaim, and then collapsed back into his bed, murmuring the words, 'ושבתי בשלום אל בית אבי', before returning his pure שמים to נשמים.
